



A Few Of The Averted School Shootings This Year Due To Anonymous Reporting

These Real-life incidents underscore the importance of speaking up when you see warning signs.

Courage2Report simplifies this process by notifying law enforcement and schools on your behalf. Available 24/7, it offers multiple anonymous reporting options, even in the middle of the night, helping to combat the stigma of snitching and ensuring every tip is taken seriously and acted upon. Teaching students and staff to recognize and report threats immediately can save lives.


Missouri has not experienced incidents like those previously mentioned this year, highlighting the effectiveness of early intervention through the Pathway to Violence model.

The model outlines stages leading to targeted violence—grievance, planning, preparation, reconnaissance, and attack—while emphasizing that individuals may skip or repeat steps. It's a flexible tool for spotting warning signs (e.g., leakage, concerning behaviors) and intervening early.

Courage2Report receives hundreds of tips annually, many involving threats to kill or school shootings. These reports have led to interventions and arrests, preventing potential violence. While Missouri sees many threats, the goal remains prevention, not reaction.

School safety relies on layered strategies: physical security, training, mental health resources, and proactive support to stop students from progressing beyond early grievance or violent ideation.

[A National Institute of Justice study](#) found schools with anonymous reporting systems had **13.5% fewer violent incidents** than those without.



10 Critical Warning Signs of Violence

List of ten potential warning signs* that can signal an individual may be in crisis or need help:

1. Suddenly **withdrawing** from friends, family, and activities (including online or via social media)
2. **Bullying**, especially if targeted towards **differences in race, religion, gender, or sexual orientation**
3. **Excessive** irritability, lack of patience, or becoming angry quickly
4. Experiencing **chronic loneliness or social isolation**
5. Expressing **persistent thoughts of harming** themselves or someone else
6. Making **direct threats** toward a place, another person, or themselves
7. Bragging about **access to guns** or weapons
8. Recruiting accomplices or audiences for an **attack**
9. **Obsession** with online violent content, mass shooters, or weapons
10. **Cruelty** to animals


In 2021, the Secret Service conducted a study analyzing 67 different incidents of planned plots of school violence. These were cases of individuals who were in the end stages of committing an act of school violence, and the threat was averted. They gathered information from law enforcement, schools, family and friends, as well as the plotters themselves.

This data helps to:

- Identify future threats
- See how likely it is for a school to be a target as well as where you fit into the statistics.
- Identify where you may have shortcomings
- Work to create and improve the environment and day-to-day for our students.

- * 81% of attackers had at least one other person aware of their plan.
- * 59% had more than one person know about their violent intentions.
- * 93% of perpetrators exhibited concerning behavior prior to the attack, suggesting preventability.
- * 94% of plotters shared their intentions with others, according to another study referencing Secret Service findings.


Resources / Trainings

Handle With Care



In November Courage2Report received and delivered **46** handle with care notifications to schools and law enforcement across the state.

Handle With Care Summary

- The notifications arrive at the school before the start of the next school day.
- No details are ever given.
- Notifications do not stay in the child's permanent records.
- Sets up schools to be proactive, rather than reactive.
- Can reduce disciplinary action and absenteeism while building resilience, self-respect, and confidence.
- Strengthens and improves relationships in the community.
- Reduces a child's risk of being inserted into the juvenile justice system for behaviors at school.
